The main causes of deafness and hearing loss are Congenital causes (present at or soon after birth) or infectious diseases such as meningitis, malaria and measles which are rife in developing countries.Medicine that saves lives (e.g. treatments for malaria and TB), poor ante natal and postnatal care and untreated ear infections can damage hearing.

“We know that children's brains develop in response to exposure to sounds, so it should not be too surprising that even mild-to-moderate levels of hearing loss can lead to changes in the brain.” says Dr Axelle Calcus, lead author of the paper, from PSL University, Paris.

Some possible causes of hearing loss that may be detected during routine tests include: glue ear – a build-up of fluid in the middle ear, which is common in young children infections that develop in the womb or at birth, such as rubella or cytomegalovirus, which can cause progressive hearing loss

When appropriate to the child, management of hearing loss in children should include: Intervention to develop early communication skills (e.g., eye contact, initiation, turn-taking) (Grade C Recommendation).
